Main topic + comparable grievances from other camps

The broadcast covers five thematically distinct segments. Politically relevant are above all segment 2 (FDP Justice Minister Buschmann refuses reform), segment 3 (Trump/Musk/AI disinformation), segment 4 (CDU/CSU demand for a sex purchase ban) and segment 5 (satire on Friedrich Merz). Comparable grievances from other camps — such as AI disinformation by democratic actors, tenancy law problems under SPD-led state governments, or women's policy deficits in the SPD/Greens — are not examined. The broadcast directs its critical energy almost exclusively at the bourgeois-conservative and right-populist spectrum (CDU/CSU, FDP, Trump/Musk), while left-wing and green positions are consistently framed as solution providers.



CHAPTER 1 — DETAILED ANALYSIS OF THE 15 CRITERIA

Hard facts — 9 techniques that are countable and scientifically robust

1. EXPERT SELECTION

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Expert 1: Philipp Lorenz-Spreen (TU Dresden, AI research)

Source deep-check:

(a) FUNDING: TU Dresden — state-funded university. Third-party funding not specified. Possible funding through EU research programmes (Horizon), which are oriented towards regulation.

(b) MANDATE: Researches societal consequences of AI — compatible with critical assessment, but structurally regulation-affine (research relevance increases with perceived threat).

- Conflict of interest present? INDIRECT (research relevance dependent on problem perception)
- Personal risk from position? NO
- Does the organisation benefit from its assessment? YES (research funding, visibility)
- Result: MEDIUM

(c) SUBJECT EXPERTISE: Framed as a neutral scientist, although structurally regulation-affine → Technique No. 12 applicable.

Expert 2: Imran Ahmed (Center for Countering Digital Hate, Washington)

Source deep-check:

(a) FUNDING: CCDH is an NGO based in Washington and London. Funding through progressive foundations (including Open Society-adjacent network, not fully transparent). Explicitly advocacy-oriented.

(b) MANDATE: Explicitly against "digital hate" — not neutral, but advocacy. Mandate is NOT compatible with neutral assessment.

- Conflict of interest present? YES (organisation benefits from problem portrayal)
- Personal risk from position? NO
- Does the organisation benefit from its assessment? YES (donation relevance, political visibility)
- Result: LOW

(c) SUBJECT EXPERTISE: Framed as an expert, but is an activist of a politically positioned NGO → Technique No. 12 clearly applicable.

Expert 3: Konstantin von Notz (MP, Greens — intelligence oversight)

Source deep-check:

(a) FUNDING: Greens politician — party-politically funded.

(b) MANDATE: Party politician, not an independent expert. Mandate is NOT compatible with neutral assessment.

- Conflict of interest present? YES (party-political interest)

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- Personal risk from position? NO
- Does the organisation benefit from its assessment? YES (political profiling)
- Result: LOW

(c) SUBJECT EXPERTISE: Framed as "chief intelligence overseer" — an institutional role that conceals his party-political positioning → Technique No. 12 applicable.

Expert 4: Sebastian Bartels (Tenants' Protection Association)

Source deep-check:

(a) FUNDING: Tenants' interest association — structurally partisan towards landlord interests.

(b) MANDATE: Explicitly interest representation — NOT compatible with neutral assessment.

- Personal risk from position? NO
- Does the organisation benefit from its assessment? YES
- Result: LOW

(c) SUBJECT EXPERTISE: Framed as a subject expert, but is an interest representative → Technique No. 12 applicable.

Missing expert groups:

- Independent criminologists on the effectiveness of the sex purchase ban
- Landlord associations / property rights lawyers
- Conservative or libertarian AI researchers
- Independent electoral law experts (US) on AI disinformation
- Europol-critical data protection lawyers (not only defence lawyers)



2. SOURCE SELECTION

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Claims without primary source = penalty points (rumour check)

Source 1: German Tenants' Association (Sebastian Bartels)

Timestamp approx. 28:00 — Statement: *"We demand that a fine offence be created."*

- (a) **Funding and sponsorship:** Tenants' interest association, funded by membership fees. Structurally partisan towards landlord interests.
- (b) **Structural conflict of interest:** Organisation benefits from problem portrayal (member relevance, political visibility).
- (c) **Missing counter-source:** Haus & Grund (landlord association) is not cited.

Source 2: Center for Countering Digital Hate (Imran Ahmed)

Timestamp approx. 40:00 — Statement: *"We know that a lot of images were faked."*

- (a) **Funding:** NGO with non-transparent funding, progressive orientation, based in Washington/London.
- (b) **Structural conflict of interest:** Organisation benefits from problem portrayal (donation relevance, political visibility). Explicitly advocacy-oriented.
- (c) **Missing counter-source:** No voice from platform representatives (apart from Eleven Labs statement), no independent media researchers.

Source 3: Greens parliamentary group Berlin (House of Representatives)

Timestamp approx. 28:00 — Statement: *"The Berlin Senate is instructed to develop reform proposals..."*

- (a) **Funding:** Party-political.
- (b) **Structural conflict of interest:** Party-political interest in problem portrayal (profiling).
- (c) **Missing counter-source:** CDU/FDP positions on the tenancy law question are not cited.

Source 4: SPD parliamentary group in the Bundestag

Timestamp approx. 29:00 — Statement: *"We would like to restrict the circle of those entitled to first or second-degree relatives."*

- (a) **Funding:** Party-political.
- (b) **Structural conflict of interest:** Party-political interest.
- (c) **Missing counter-source:** No constitutional law assessment on the restriction of property rights (Art. 14 GG).

Summary: The source selection is structurally one-sided — interest associations and party politicians from the progressive spectrum are framed as subject experts, while counter-positions (landlord associations, conservative legal politicians, independent researchers) are absent. None of the cited sources is structurally independent.

Overall distribution of critical airtime:

- Right/conservative (CDU/CSU, FDP, Trump/Musk): ~19 min. critical
- Left/progressive (SPD, Greens, democratic side): 0 min. critical
- Neutral: ~20 min.

Summary: Critical airtime is entirely concentrated on the conservative and right-populist spectrum. Progressive actors receive exclusively positive or neutral portrayal. This does not comply with the requirement of balance pursuant to §26 MStV.



4. OMISSION (CORE CRITERION Investigative)

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Omission 1: The Biden deepfake was commissioned by a Democrat-aligned political consultant (Paul Carpenter states this explicitly). This information is mentioned in the segment, but immediately passed over — the segment immediately pivots to Trump/Musk as the main perpetrators. The question of whether democratic actors also use or commission AI disinformation is not raised.

Omission 2: The legalisation of prostitution in 2002 took place under the red-green federal government (Schröder/Fischer). This political responsibility for the current state of affairs ("brothel of Europe") is not named anywhere in the segment. Instead, the CDU/CSU demand for a sex purchase ban is the only political position subjected to critical scrutiny.

Omission 3: In the personal-use eviction segment, FDP Justice Minister Buschmann is portrayed as inactive. Not mentioned is the fact that tenancy law is a matter for the federal states and that SPD-led federal states (e.g. Berlin, Hamburg) have likewise taken no effective measures against fraudulent personal-use evictions. The Berlin Senate (CDU/SPD coalition) is only mentioned through a Greens motion.

Omission 4: Evaluation data on the Swedish sex purchase ban are not presented. The scientific debate on the effectiveness of the "Nordic model" is controversial — studies show both positive and negative effects. This complexity is entirely absent.

Omission 5: In the Sky ECC segment, the legal problems of mass surveillance by Europol are only addressed by a defence lawyer. Civil liberties perspectives (e.g. Society for Civil Rights, Digitalcourage) are entirely absent.

Summary: The omissions follow a consistent pattern: political responsibility of left-wing and green actors is systematically blanked out, while conservative and right-populist actors appear as the sole cause of problems. Particularly serious is the concealment of the red-green responsibility for the legalisation of prostitution and the selective portrayal of AI disinformation as a primarily right-wing phenomenon.

Missing voices

- FDP Justice Minister Buschmann (in person): Only written statement, no direct questioning
- Independent prostitution researchers: No scientific evidence on the effectiveness of the sex purchase ban (Swedish model) from a neutral source
- Trump camp / Republican spokespeople: No own voice in the AI segment
- Landlord (personal-use eviction case): No direct statement
- Critics of Sky ECC surveillance from a civil liberties perspective: Only defence lawyer, no civil rights activist
- Swedish authorities / evaluation data on the sex purchase ban: No primary sources on effectiveness
- AI disinformation by democratic actors: Not addressed (e.g. Biden deepfake was commissioned by a Democrat-aligned consultant — this context is absent)



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- Landlord associations / property owner interests: No voice in the personal-use eviction segment



5. MANIPULATION OF FIGURES									5/10
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Complete figures include: absolute value, share (%) and trend

Finding 1:

Timestamp	approx. 53:00 — Quote: "250,000 is the estimate of the Union; there is no evidence for this figure." — Assessment: Positive — the broadcast itself points out the lack of verifiability. This is an example of correct journalistic contextualisation.
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Finding 2:

Timestamp	approx. 28:00 — Quote: "According to the German Tenants' Association, there are an estimated approximately 80,000 personal-use evictions per year across Germany." — Assessment: The figure comes from an interest organisation (Tenants' Association) and is presented as fact without source verification. No cross-check by landlord associations or official statistics.
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Finding 3:

Timestamp	approx. 14:00 — Quote: "I think we prevented 114 murders." — Assessment: The figure is cited by a Europol representative and not questioned. It is unclear how "prevented murders" are methodologically determined — a critical follow-up question is absent.
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Summary: The use of figures is mixed — the broadcast correctly points out unsubstantiated CDU figures, but uncritically adopts figures from interest associations (Tenants' Association) and authorities (Europol).

Effect	Suggests that Merz's scepticism towards gender quotas is ideologically comparable to authoritarian regimes. This is a politically effective association, even if packaged as satire.

Association 2:	
Timestamp	approx. 36:00
Quote	<i>**"Two rich white men with a common goal."*</i>
Technique: Trump and Musk are linked through a shared identity category ("rich white men") that implicitly carries negative connotations.	
Effect	Suggests that their political collaboration is motivated by shared privilege, not by political convictions.

For persons framed as conspiracy theorists:

In this broadcast, no persons are explicitly labelled "conspiracy theorists". The framing of Trump as a spreader of "lies" and the "stolen election" narrative comes close to this category:

SOURCE CHECK (Trump / "Stop the Steal"):

- Does Trump work with verifiable primary sources? NO (election fraud claims were dismissed by courts)
- Are his core statements falsifiable? YES (courts have falsified them)

RISK MATRIX:

- What has Trump lost through his position? Presidency 2020, criminal proceedings
- What does he gain? Mobilisation of the base, political relevance
- Net: risk \approx gain \rightarrow no increased credibility

TONALITY: Emotionally mobilising, no uncertainties acknowledged

RESULT CATEGORY: C — Conspiracy ideologue (unsubstantiated claims, judicially falsified)

Note: This categorisation is based on the criteria of the framework, not on the framing by the broadcast.



7. TIMING

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Finding 1:

The AI disinformation segment is broadcast shortly before the US presidential election on 5 November 2024. This is journalistically legitimate (topical relevance), but the one-sided portrayal (Trump/Musk as perpetrators, democratic side as victim) in immediate proximity to the election campaign considerably amplifies the political effect.

Finding 2:

The satire segment on Friedrich Merz appears in the context of the beginning federal election campaign (broadcast presumably October/November 2024). The placement of a satire comparing Merz with Erdogan, Orban and Xi Jinping in a news broadcast shortly before the election campaign is timing-relevant.

Summary: The timing of both politically relevant segments (AI disinformation, Merz satire) falls in a phase close to the election campaign, which amplifies the asymmetric political effect.



8. SELECTIVE OUTRAGE (CORE CRITERION Investigative)

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Outrage = bias. Selective outrage reinforces the finding. Score = degree of outrage (0–5) + selectivity (0–5)

Methodological principle (v2.5): Before each assessment, the triggering event must be documented. A reaction can only be assessed as selective if comparable triggers in other positions did not produce an analogous reaction.

Finding 1:

Timestamp

approx. 36:00 — Triggering event: Elon Musk posts AI-generated fake with Kamala Harris's voice on X — Reaction: **"Elon Musk campaigns for Trump on X with crude propaganda."** — Comparison: The Biden deepfake (produced on behalf of a Democratic political consultant) is mentioned in the same segment, but without a comparable outrage formulation — Asymmetry: Identical triggering event (AI deepfake for electoral manipulation), but dramatically different reaction intensity depending on the political direction of the perpetrator.

Finding 2:

Timestamp

approx. 53:00 — Triggering event: CDU/CSU demands sex purchase ban — Reaction: The entire segment is structured so that all those interviewed (sex workers, brothel operators, police officers, forced prostitution victims) assess the CDU demand as ineffective or counterproductive — Comparison: The legalisation of 2002 (SPD/Greens) as the cause of the current state of affairs ("brothel of Europe") is not treated with comparable outrage — Asymmetry: The political responsibility for the grievance lies with the red-green legalisation, but the outrage is directed against the CDU reform demand.

Finding 3:

Timestamp

approx. 70:00 — Triggering event: Friedrich Merz expresses scepticism towards gender quotas — Reaction: Satire comparing Merz with Erdogan, Orban and Xi Jinping — Comparison: Comparable statements by SPD or Greens politicians on women's policy (e.g. actual underrepresentation of women in SPD state governments) are not treated satirically — Asymmetry: Selective outrage about conservative women's policy while simultaneously not addressing progressive deficits.

Summary: Selective outrage is the most serious individual criterion of this broadcast. Identical or comparable grievances are treated with dramatically different intensity depending on the political direction of the perpetrator. This is the core characteristic of structurally one-sided reporting.

[A] Accused perspective (landlord personal-use eviction): OMITTED

Timestamp: approx. 22:00–35:00 — Quote: "The owner himself tells me that he lives in Colombia." — Assessment: The landlord does not speak for himself; his perspective is conveyed exclusively through the detective and the tenant.

[B] FDP Justice Ministry: INDICATED

Timestamp: approx. 30:00 — Quote: Written communication from the Ministry (content not fully cited) — Assessment: Only included as a written statement, no own voice, no follow-up question.

[C] CDU/CSU sex purchase ban: ADDRESSED (one-sided)

Timestamp: approx. 55:00 — Quote: "We therefore advocate a sex purchase ban." — Assessment: Position is presented, but systematically dismantled by counter-arguments from all other interviewees.

[D] Voluntary sex workers: ADDRESSED

Timestamp: approx. 42:00 — Quote: "Do I give the impression that I do it under compulsion?" — Assessment: Perspective present, but subordinate in the context of the overall segment.

[E] Forced prostitution victims: ADDRESSED

Timestamp: approx. 50:00 — Quote: "In my case unfortunately not much." — Assessment: Portrayed in detail and emotionally.

[F] Brothel operators: ADDRESSED

Timestamp: approx. 57:00 — Quote: "I say I am a commercial room rental." — Assessment: Present, but framed as an interest representative.

[G] Democratic actors as AI victims: ADDRESSED (one-sided)

Timestamp: approx. 36:00 — Quote: "Harris is defamed as a member of the paedophile network around Jeffrey Epstein." — Assessment: Only the democratic side portrayed as victim.

[H] Republican camp / Trump: OMITTED (own voice)

Timestamp: none — Assessment: Trump/Musk are characterised exclusively by opponents; no own statement obtained.

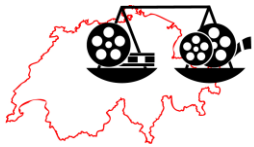
[I] Data protection perspective (Lödden): ADDRESSED

Timestamp: approx. 18:00 — Quote: "This is definitely the greatest intrusion into privacy." — Assessment: Present, but treated as a marginal voice.

[J] Independent prostitution research: OMITTED

Timestamp: none — Assessment: No independent scientific perspective on the effectiveness of the sex purchase ban obtained.

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Soft facts — 6 qualitative techniques

10. FRAMING

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Finding 1:

Timestamp

approx. 36:00–44:00 — Quote: **"Above all, the Trump camp is using the new technologies."** — Manipulation: **"Selective attribution"** — Why problematic: The segment begins with the Biden deepfake (produced by a Democrat-aligned consultant), but then immediately pivots to Trump/Musk as the main actors. The statement "above all the Trump camp" is an unsubstantiated claim that creates the impression that AI disinformation is a primarily right-wing phenomenon, even though the only concretely shown perpetrator (Paul Carpenter) worked for a Democratic political consultant.

Finding 2:

Timestamp

approx. 53:00–65:00 — Quote: **"Germany is considered the brothel of Europe."** (presenter text) — Manipulation: **"Emotional priming / shock framing"** — Why problematic: The formulation places the entire segment under a moral sign that implicitly frames the legalisation of 2002 (under SPD/Greens) as a mistake, without explicitly naming this political responsibility. At the same time, the CDU/CSU demand for a sex purchase ban is portrayed as naive through the overall dramaturgy of the segment.

Finding 3:

Timestamp

approx. 70:00–75:00 — Quote: **"To the good fortune of equal rights, our satirists [...] have found someone who is quasi a women's advancement plan in human form: Friedrich Merz."** — Manipulation: **"Ironic framing as statement of fact"** — Why problematic: The satire is presented as an independent format, but placed in the editorial context of a news broadcast. The boundary between satirical exaggeration and journalistic statement blurs; comparable satire on SPD or Greens politicians is entirely absent from the broadcast.

Summary: The framing of the broadcast is consistently asymmetric — conservative and right-populist actors are framed as problem causers, progressive positions as solution providers. Particularly serious is the selective attribution of AI disinformation to the "Trump camp", even though the only concretely shown perpetrator worked for Democratic clients.



11. CHOICE OF WORDS AND TERMS

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Finding 1:

Timestamp

approx. 36:00 — Quote: **“Two rich white men with a common goal.”** — Manipulation: **“Identity-political framing / ad hominem framing”** — Why problematic: The characterisation of Trump and Musk as “rich white men” is not a factual description of their political actions, but an identity-political devaluation. This formulation would be unthinkable for politicians of a different skin colour or political direction and violates the requirement of journalistic objectivity.

Finding 2:

Timestamp

approx. 36:00 — Quote: **“Elon Musk campaigns for Trump on X with crude propaganda.”** — Manipulation: **“Evaluative qualification without evidence”** — Why problematic: “Crude propaganda” is a journalistic value judgement, not a description. Comparable activities by democratic supporters (e.g. Taylor Swift endorsement, Hollywood campaigns for Harris) are not described with equivalent language.

Finding 3:

Timestamp

approx. 53:00 — Quote: **“Germany is considered the brothel of Europe.”** — Manipulation: **“Stigmatising metaphor”** — Why problematic: The formulation is a moral devaluation that frames the state of legalisation (decided under SPD/Greens 2002) as a disgrace, without naming the political responsibility.

Finding 4:

Timestamp

approx. 70:00 — Quote: **“Internationally successful statesmen such as Erdogan, Orban or of course Xi Jinping also make sure to burden as few women as possible with important tasks.”** — Manipulation: **“Guilt by association through satire”** — Why problematic: Merz is placed through the satire in a line with Erdogan, Orban and Xi Jinping. Even as satire, this is a politically effective association that is problematic in a public broadcaster's programme without a counterweight.

Summary: The choice of words is consistently evaluative and derogatory when describing conservative and right-populist actors, while progressive positions are described neutrally or positively. In particular, the formulations “rich white men” and “crude propaganda” fall below journalistic standards of objectivity.



12. MODERATION BEHAVIOUR

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Methodological principle (v2.5): Before each assessment, the triggering event must be documented. An intervention can only be assessed as asymmetric if comparable triggers with other guests did not produce an analogous intervention.

Finding 1:

Timestamp

approx. 30:00 — Triggering event: FDP Justice Ministry refuses personal statement, only written statement — Quote (moderation): *"Responsible for a reform of the personal-use eviction is FDP Federal Justice Minister Marco Buschmann. But he sees no need for action."* — Comparison: SPD and Greens politicians are cited in the same segment without critical framing (approx. 28:00–29:00) — Asymmetry: The FDP minister's refusal is framed as "no need for action" (implicitly: indifference), while SPD/Greens demands are presented as constructive solution proposals. The Ministry's written statement is not fully cited, so the reasoning cannot be assessed.

Finding 2:

Timestamp

approx. 36:00 — Triggering event: Portrayal of Elon Musk as Trump's election campaign helper — Quote (moderation): *"Such as Elon Musk, owner of the platform X."* — Comparison: Comparable democratic billionaires (e.g. George Soros, Reid Hoffman) as election campaign supporters of the Democrats are not mentioned — Asymmetry: The influence of billionaires on election campaigns is portrayed exclusively as a right-wing phenomenon.

Note: Since this is a magazine format without live studio guests, moderation behaviour is primarily shaped by introductory commentary and voice-over. Classic interview asymmetries (interruptions, follow-up questions) are structurally limited.

Summary: Moderation behaviour shows a consistent asymmetric framing: conservative and right-populist actors are critically framed through choice of formulation and selective citation, while progressive positions are introduced neutrally or positively.



13. QUESTION ASYMMETRY

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Asymmetry 1:

In the prostitution segment, Friedrich Merz (CDU) is confronted through the satire with the question of whether half of the ministers under him would be women. A comparable question to the SPD or Greens (e.g. on the actual implementation of parity in state governments) is not posed.

Asymmetry 2:

In the personal-use eviction segment, the FDP Ministry is confronted in writing and the response is framed as inadequate. SPD and Greens politicians are not confronted with the question of why no effective measures exist in the federal states they govern either.

Asymmetry 3:

In the AI segment, Paul Carpenter (who produced the Biden deepfake) is asked how he uses the technology — but not whether he had moral reservations about producing a fake for a Democratic political consultant. The question of democratic co-responsibility is not raised.

Summary: The question asymmetry follows the overall pattern of the broadcast: critical follow-up questions are directed exclusively at conservative and right-populist actors, while progressive actors are not confronted with comparable questions.



14. FALSE BALANCE

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Finding 1:

In the prostitution segment, the CDU/CSU demand for a sex purchase ban is dismantled by a multitude of counter-voices (sex workers, brothel operators, police officers, forced prostitution victims). This is not false balance, but a genuine imbalance in favour of one side. Positively noted: forced prostitution victim Nadine Jüngling herself says a sex purchase ban would not have helped her — this is an honest portrayal that argues against the simple solution.

Finding 2:

In the AI segment, no Republican voice is obtained to defend or contextualise the use of AI content. This is not false balance (no token counterbalance), but complete one-sidedness.

Finding 3:

In the personal-use eviction segment, the FDP Ministry is represented by a written statement, while tenant protection advocates and SPD/Greens politicians speak personally and at length. This is a structural imbalance disguised as false balance (there is formally a counter-voice, but it is structurally disadvantaged).

Summary: The broadcast avoids classic false balance (token counterbalance between unequal positions), but shows a structural imbalance in which conservative positions are formally represented but systematically disadvantaged through dramaturgy and time distribution.



15. AGENDA-SETTING

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Finding 1:

The broadcast's choice of topics sets a clear political agenda: all four politically relevant segments (personal-use eviction, AI disinformation, prostitution, Merz satire) are directed against the conservative and right-populist spectrum. Comparable grievances in the progressive spectrum (e.g. housing policy under SPD mayors, AI disinformation by democratic actors, women's policy deficits in the SPD/Greens) are not addressed.

Finding 2:

The placement of the Merz satire as the last segment of the broadcast sets a concluding frame: the broadcast ends with an explicitly political message against the CDU chancellor candidate. This is a deliberate agenda-setting decision.

Finding 3:

The AI disinformation segment sets the agenda that AI manipulation is primarily a problem of the right-wing spectrum. This agenda-setting decision has immediate effects on public perception shortly before the US election and in the run-up to the German federal election campaign.

Summary: The broadcast's agenda-setting is consistently one-sided: all politically relevant topics are selected and framed in such a way that they burden the conservative and right-populist spectrum. This does not comply with the requirement of balance in topic selection pursuant to §26 MStV.



CHAPTER 2 — OVERALL EVALUATION

Results

(Scale: 1 = maximum manipulation/one-sidedness; 10 = complete balance)

Dominant techniques

- 1. Selective outrage (score 2):** Identical grievances are treated with dramatically different intensity depending on the political direction of the perpetrator. Particularly serious: AI deepfake by democratic client vs. Trump/Musk deepfakes.
- 2. Omission (score 2):** Systematic blanking out of political responsibility of the progressive spectrum — in particular the red-green responsibility for the legalisation of prostitution in 2002 and democratic AI disinformation.
- 3. Framing + choice of words (score 3 each):** Consistently asymmetric language and framing — conservative actors as perpetrators/failures, progressives as solution providers.

...

- Balanced investigative journalism (score 8-10)
- Slight tendency (score 6-7)
- Clear one-sidedness in topic selection (score 4-5)
- Systematic imbalance (score 2-3)
- Extreme imbalance / activism (score 1)

...

Reasoning: The broadcast shows a systematic imbalance that runs through all levels of analysis: topic selection, framing, choice of words, expert selection, source selection and time distribution are consistently directed against the conservative and right-populist spectrum. Particularly serious is the selective outrage in the AI segment, where a democratically commissioned deepfake serves as the hook, but the outrage is directed exclusively against Trump/Musk. The placement of a Merz satire (comparison with Erdogan/Orban/Xi) as the conclusion of a news broadcast in the run-up to the federal election campaign crosses the boundary between investigative journalism and political activism. The Sky ECC segment is the only politically neutral segment of the broadcast.

CONCLUSION

The analysed Frontal broadcast does not meet the requirements of §26 MStV regarding balance and diversity of opinion. While the Sky ECC segment meets investigative standards, the remaining four segments show a consistent political imbalance: all critical content is directed against the conservative and right-populist spectrum (CDU/CSU, FDP, Trump, Musk), while the progressive spectrum (SPD, Greens, democratic side) appears exclusively as solution provider or victim. Particularly problematic is the use of a satire (Merz comparison with Erdogan/Orban/Xi) within a news broadcast without a comparable counterweight, as well as the selective portrayal of AI disinformation as a primarily right-wing phenomenon, even though the only concretely shown perpetrator worked for Democratic clients. The broadcast thus moves on the boundary between investigative journalism and political activism, which conflicts with the requirement of state independence and balance of the ZDF State Treaty.

Note: Trump/Musk are not counted as German parties, but their treatment (-5) reinforces the overall picture of an anti-conservative orientation.

Party bias summary

- Most favoured: Greens (+3), SPD (+2) — consistently framed as solution providers, no critical treatment
- Most disadvantaged: CDU/CSU (-4) — sex purchase ban demand dismantled, Merz satirically compared with dictators, Buschmann framed as inactive
- Conclusion: The party-political bias of the broadcast is clear and consistent: the red-green spectrum is favoured, the bourgeois-conservative spectrum is disadvantaged. Particularly striking is the fact that the SPD/Greens responsibility for the legalisation of prostitution in 2002 — which is framed as the cause of the state of affairs lamented in the segment — is completely blanked out, while the CDU/CSU reform demand is treated critically. This is a structural distortion that goes beyond editorial prioritisation.



CHAPTER 4 — LEGAL CLASSIFICATION (§26 MStV / ZDF State Treaty)

Violation 1:

Norm: §26 para. 1 MStV (diversity of opinion, balance) — Facts: Systematic one-sidedness in topic selection — Evidence: All four politically relevant segments are directed against the conservative/right-populist spectrum; comparable grievances in the progressive spectrum are not examined — Assessment: The topic selection of an individual broadcast does not need to be fully balanced; for a magazine such as Frontal, however, it must be examined whether the overall orientation is balanced across multiple broadcasts. The present broadcast shows an intensity of one-sidedness that is also problematic in the individual case.

Violation 2:

Norm: §26 para. 2 MStV (objectivity requirement) / ZDF State Treaty §5 (impartiality) — Facts: Use of a political satire (Merz comparison with Erdogan/Orban/Xi) within a news broadcast without a comparable counterweight — Evidence: approx. 70:00–74:00, satire segment as a regular broadcast component — Assessment: Satire is in principle permissible as an expression of opinion; its embedding in a news broadcast without labelling as an opinion piece and without comparable satire on other political camps is, however, difficult to reconcile with the objectivity requirement and the requirement of impartiality.

Violation 3:

Norm: §26 para. 1 MStV (completeness of essential information) — Facts: Omission of the red-green responsibility for the legalisation of prostitution in 2002 in the context of the prostitution segment — Evidence: Entire segment approx. 53:00–68:00 — Assessment: The legalisation of 2002 is essential for understanding the current state of affairs; its omission while simultaneously criticising the CDU/CSU reform demand constitutes a relevant omission of information.

Overall assessment §26 MStV

Frontal, as a ZDF production, is bound by the ZDF State Treaty and §26 MStV. Investigative journalism is legitimate and worthy of protection; however, topic selection must be balanced over time. The present broadcast shows an intensity of political one-sidedness that goes beyond legitimate investigative prioritisation: the consistent orientation of all politically relevant segments against the conservative spectrum, the use of a satire with a dictator comparison in a news broadcast, and the systematic blanking out of progressive co-responsibility for the grievances addressed are not fully compatible with the requirement of balance and impartiality of the ZDF State Treaty. The competent supervisory authority is the ZDF Television Council; in the case of persistent complaints, the legal supervision of the state of Rhineland-Palatinate.

1. German Tenants' Association (Sebastian Bartels)

- 1. FUNDING:** Membership fees of affiliated tenants' associations; no state funding. Structurally partisan towards landlord interests.

- 2. MANDATE:** Scientific research on AI consequences — in principle compatible with neutral assessment, but structurally regulation-affine.
- 3. CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** INDIRECT — research relevance and funding increase with perceived threat from AI.
- 4. CREDIBILITY MATRIX:** Conflict of interest INDIRECT | Personal risk NO | Benefits YES → Credibility: MEDIUM
- 5. COUNTER-VOICE:** No voice from AI researchers who assess the impact of deepfakes on electoral decisions more sceptically (e.g. researchers who show that deepfakes are less effective than assumed).
4. Konstantin von Notz (MP, Alliance 90/The Greens)
- 1. FUNDING:** Party-political (Greens); Bundestag mandate.
- 2. MANDATE:** Party politician — NOT compatible with neutral assessment. Framed as "chief intelligence overseer", which conceals his partisanship.
- 3. CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** YES — party-political interest in problem portrayal (profiling, regulatory agenda of the Greens).
- 4. CREDIBILITY MATRIX:** Conflict of interest YES | Personal risk NO | Benefits YES → Credibility: LOW (as neutral specialist body)
- 5. COUNTER-VOICE:** No voice from a conservative or liberal intelligence politician with a differing assessment.
5. Europol representative (not named)
- 1. FUNDING:** EU authority, state-funded.
- 2. MANDATE:** Law enforcement authority — structurally interested in portraying its own successes and expanding its powers.
- 3. CONFLICT OF INTEREST:** YES — authority benefits from positive portrayal of its surveillance measures (legitimation, budget security).
- 4. CREDIBILITY MATRIX:** Conflict of interest YES | Personal risk NO | Benefits YES → Credibility: LOW (as neutral assessment of the proportionality of surveillance)
- 5. COUNTER-VOICE:** Defence lawyer Lödten is cited — this is to be noted positively. Civil liberties NGOs are, however, absent.

Overall finding source deep-check: None of the cited specialist bodies is structurally independent. All have institutional interests that coincide with the position they take in the broadcast. The broadcast consistently frames these sources as neutral experts without naming conflicts of interest. This is a systematic quality problem that structurally impairs the credibility of the reporting.

In doing so, they shall promote international understanding, European integration and social cohesion in the Federation and the Länder. Their offerings shall serve education, information, advice and entertainment. They shall offer contributions in particular to culture. Entertainment shall correspond to a public broadcasting offering profile.
- §5 para. 1 ZDF State Treaty: Obligation to objectivity and impartiality of reporting, consideration of diversity of opinion.
- ARD State Treaty: Universal service mandate with objectivity and impartiality.

Core obligations

- 1. Diversity of opinion (internal pluralism):** All relevant perspectives must be represented in the overall programme
- 2. Objectivity and balance:** Presenters must treat guests to the same standards
- 3. Contribution to opinion formation:** Audience must receive sufficient information for independent opinion formation

Supervisory authority

- Broadcasting councils of the state broadcasting institutions: supervision of ARD institutions (BR, WDR, NDR, etc.)
- ZDF Television Council (§19 ZDF State Treaty): supervision of ZDF programme
- Legal supervision: respective federal state (ZDF: Rhineland-Palatinate)

Complaints procedure

1. Programme complaint to the competent broadcasting council or ZDF Television Council
2. Administrative court action



APPENDIX 2: SCIENTIFIC FOUNDATIONS

Literature

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Unbalanced reporting is the response to the halving initiative in Switzerland: here the manipulation techniques are explained in detail, starting with the selection of staff and source selection. Subsequently, 15 principles are explained: omission, framing, temporal framing, guilt by association, emotionalisation, context removal and many more, illustrated with many examples. In addition, it becomes apparent where we ourselves apply these techniques — this promotes not only insight but also empathy.

Optionally the book comes with **playing cards**

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The interview is not a conversation. It is a stage — and someone else has written the script.

Those who do not know this provide material. Good quotes that are cut incorrectly. Correct statements that end up in the wrong context. Honest answers that are framed as confessions.

This book is not a media criticism book. It is a toolbox — for all those who have a microphone in front of their face and want to know what they can do about it. 7 chapters. 7 tools: What an interview really is. The 7 most common traps. The three basic principles of sovereignty — anchoring, reframing, setting boundaries. Preparation in one hour. Body and voice. What to do when things go wrong. And what counts after the interview.

For politicians, activists, entrepreneurs, whistleblowers — for all those who are exposed and want to understand how the game works. So that they stop playing along — and start shaping it.

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You think you see the world. In reality you see the frame that someone has placed around it. Framing is the oldest and most elegant manipulation technique in the world. It does not change the facts — it changes what we make of the facts. How we feel. What we believe. How we decide. And it works — because we all participate. Daily. Unconsciously. You too. This book is not a dry textbook. It is a workbook — playful, direct, full of examples from real life.
